The Exhumation of Two Renaissance Humanists





Pico della Mirandola

Angelo Ambrogini (Poliziano)

According to BBC-News (http://news.bbc.co.uk/2/hi/europe /6920443.stm), in July 2007, scientists exhumed the bodies of two Renaissance humanists, Pico della Mirandola and Angelo Ambrogini (also known as Poliziano or Politianus), from their resting places in the Church of San Marco in Florence.

Both men died in Florence in 1494, and some mystery surrounds their deaths. Using DNA analysis, scientists hope to find out whether there is any truth to the rumor that Pico della Mirandola was poisoned. They also hope to discover the cause of Poliziano's death – either by poisoning or as a result of syphilis.

A TV documentary on the exhumations and the results of scientific investigations is being planned.
